And to practice, actively.... letting go..., and trusting God. WE need to practice this everyday, in both small and extraordinary matters..... in both in fearful times, and in seasons of calm...

As we close this final Sunday of Ordinary Time, and Black History Month....and prepare for Ash Wednesday and the Holy Season of Lent... Let us prepare ourselves to hear these words..

"Remember that you and dust, and unto dust you shall return"

Rosemary and Tom Cashman are muy simpatico as we Tucsonans might say. Newman welcomes this couple who, individually, have come from North Dakota wheat farm country (Rosemary) and (Tom) Washington D.C. via Kansas City to Columbus, Ohio, Boston and Seattle. They met in Seattle and married 26 years ago. Rosemary was raised in a large Catholic family, but Tom converted to Catholicism 14 years ago. *Bienvenidos!*

This couple is most easy to talk with engaging in all sorts of topics (ask about their trusty canine companion) and telling stories of their decision to make Tucson "home." After their search was over, Rosemary says that they "have emptied their boxes," a sign of their commitment to a new home. Tom's work originally brought them from California in 2019, He says he is "retired but works full time. Inspiring Black Catholic Americans

Servant of God Julia Greeley was born into slavery around 1840. She later became a cook and nanny once she was emancipated. At 47, she became a Catholic and had a particular devotion to the Eucharist and the Sacred Heart of Jesus. She was known to walk the pavement, despite agonizing arthritis, handing out information on the Sacred Heart League. She was known as Denver's "Angel of Charity" for her relentless charity work and dedication to the poor. Servant of God, Julia Greeley died in 1918.

St. Martin de Porres, OP was a Peruvian Dominican Friar, loved and honored by many. Born in 1579 to a Spanish nobleman and a freed daughter of slaves, he had a very difficult childhood. He dealt with abject poverty, and with social harassment because of his mixed racial heritage and illegitimate birth. His father abandoned the family when Martin and his sister were very young. However, instead of becoming bitter, these challenges taught Martin to be compassionate and prayerful. At the age of eight his father had a shares of heart and decided to also marked as multiple.

eight, his father had a change of heart and decided to claim his two *mulatto* (mixed race) children. He made sure that both were afforded a good education.

At twelve, Martin began an apprenticeship with a barber/surgeon and proved extremely skillful at this trade. His spiritual practices were also legendary. Equally legendary was his love of creatures. He would feed and heal all animals that came into his vicinity. Eventually Martin joined the Convent of the Rosary as a lay-helper. Because of his services and prayerfulness, he was soon entrusted with greater responsibilities. Eventually he made religious vows in the Dominican Order, despite his mixed racial heritage. It is his charity that made him the patron saint of social justice. Martin fed, sheltered, and doctored hundreds of families. He also provided the dowry of 4,000 pesos to enable at least 27 poor young women to marry. Last, but not least, he established the Orphanage and School of the Holy Cross, which took in boys and girls of all classes and taught them trades or homemaking skills. Despite much criticism, he insisted that the school staff be well-paid so that they would give their best service. Martin died surrounded by his Dominican brothers on November 3rd, 1639.

STEWARDSHIP REFLECTION

In today's Gospel, taken from the sixth chapter of Luke, Jesus offers a very challenging, seemingly impossible approach to daily life. "Love your enemies, do good to those who hate you, bless those who curse you, pray for those who mistreat you. To the person who strikes you on one cheek, offer the other one as well, and from the person who takes your cloak do not withhold even your tunic." It makes one want to say, "Seriously, Lord?" And He doesn't stop there. Jesus adds, "Give to everyone who asks of you, and from the one who takes what is yours do not demand it back."

It seems so unfair! That is, unless we look at this way of life from a stewardship point of view. Then, not only does it seem doable (though challenging), but it also actually makes perfect sense. A steward understands clearly that all he has and all that he is — his very life — is a gift from God given to him from an unfathomable abundance of love. This changes everything! This means "my" cloak, "my" tunic, "my" money, and time — all of it ultimately belongs to God. He has entrusted these things to each of us in love to use for His purposes and His glory.
