Fr. John Paul's Spiritual Brew

t's hard to believe that we have already arrived at the Fourth Sunday of Lent! How is your Lenten journey unfolding? Have you been able to carve out more space for prayer? Are you gaining ground in breaking unhealthy habits? Perhaps you're becoming more attuned to the needs of those around you.

Lent is a season of "spiritual spring cleaning"-a time to realign our hearts and minds, even amidst the ever-shifting tides of social, political, and ecclesiastical unrest. Wars still rage, including in Ukraine and Russia, and Pope Francis continues to call us to mirror Our Lady's fidelity-to truly listen for God's voice and respond with resounding *yes* to life and dignity in all its expressions and challenges.

In today's Gospel, we encounter a man born blind who seeks healing from Jesus. With a touch of divine grace, Jesus restores his sight-awakening not only his vision but also his faith. Those around him are astonished, while the religious leaders question and challenge the source of this miraculous transformation. But the true miracle is not just in the physical healing. The blind man, now seeing, has also received a *new vision-*a clarity of faith that empowers him to boldly testify to God's transformative power in his life. When confronted, he does not hesitate to proclaim the truth of his encounter with Jesus.

This is what happens when we allow ourselves to grow in the truth of God's love. When we open our hearts to divine grace, our spiritual eyes are *opened*, and we see with renewed clarity. This sight is more than physical-it is a vision that fills our whole being, illuminating the blind spots in our lives and calling us to love more deeply, see more justly, and respond more generously to the needs of others. As we cross the midpoint of our Lenten journey, it's worth asking:

- What have we learned?
- Has our vision sharpened or dimmed in any significant areas of our lives?
- How has our faith been challenged-perhaps to love our enemies, to give without expecting in return, or to embrace the uncomfortable work of reconciliation?
- Have we identified places in our relationships with God, others, and ourselves that need healing, honesty, or renewal?

Receiving *true* sight allows us to navigate our fears and doubts with greater hope. It gives us the courage to walk this road of life with a renewed sense of purpose. May we be strengthened in our faith commitment. May the vision *rising* from our Lenten practices bring us greater clarity, helping us to be of good and loving service to others. And may God's spirit of mercy and compassion stir within us, guiding our thoughts and actions toward deeper faith, true charity, and the healing grace that transforms lives

Fr. John Paul's Letter

My Dear St. Thomas More Newman Center Community,

I hope this letter finds you well and that your Lenten season is off to a blessed start. On Ash Wednesday, our chapel was filled to capacity with students throughout the day. We held two Liturgy of the Word services and three Masses, each with the distribution of ashes. It was truly inspiring to witness so many students actively engaging in this sacred time of reflection and renewal.

As we enter this season of Lent, we are invited to deepen our faith through prayer, fasting, and almsgiving—practices that cultivate a greater sense of hope, love, and devotion.

However, over the past several months, we have faced significant increases in our operational costs. Utility expenses have risen, retreat center fees have gone up, food prices have climbed due to greater student participation, and overall program costs have grown as we continue to serve more students.

Additionally, an unexpected and costly issue has arisen: the water pipes in my casita, which had been functioning without issue for nearly a century, began to fail. Persistent puddles on my kitchen floor led to the discovery of a spraying pipe that required immediate repair, along with another pipe that was on the brink of failure. These repairs cost us \$1,500, but we also uncovered mold and asbestos, which resulted in nearly \$22,000 in unplanned expenses. Thankfully, our diocesan property insurance covered \$10,000 of that amount.

As we work to manage these costs, we are also looking ahead to ensure the long-term sustainability of the Newman Center. To do this, we are focused on building an endowment that will support three key areas:

- 1. Student Ministry programs
- 2. Building and grounds maintenance
- 3. Ongoing operational expenses

Thanks to the generosity of Humberto Lopez, who has pledged a \$250,000 matching grant, we are making strides in this direction. I ask for your prayerful consideration in offering support at any level you are able.

In addition to grants, we are focusing on three strategies to stabilize our budget:

- 1. Securing larger donations to help build the endowment.
- 2. Increasing our weekly collection by \$3,000 to comfortably cover costs and prepare for unforeseen expenses.
- 3. Encouraging both students and non-students to contribute through Venmo, electronic giving, and weekly donations. Even \$3 to \$5 per student per week can make a significant impact when combined with the faithful contributions of our regular donors.

I recognize that the recent transition of Bishop Weisenburger to Detroit, the pause of the diocesan-wide capital campaign, and the anticipated appointment of a new bishop for Tucson may raise questions about the future of the Newman Center and our needs. The good news is that the Diocese remains committed to the Newman Center project during this time of transition, and management of this project has been entrusted to the Catholic Foundation. While I don't yet have the specifics, I anticipate that once Bishop Weisenburger is installed as Archbishop of Detroit on March 18, and an Apostolic Administrator is appointed for the interim period, a plan for moving forward on various projects, including ours, will be put in place.

I hope this brings some clarity during this time of change. Our pastoral staff, though small, is dedicated and capable. However, we cannot sustain our current level of activity without ensuring the necessary funds to support it.

Since my arrival at Newman in the fall of 2016, my vision has been to establish a substantial endowment for the Newman Center, separate from the generous support provided by the Newman Foundation, the Sustaining Board, occasional diocesan contributions, and weekly collections. This would allow us to reduce the need for constant appeals for financial support as costs rise or unexpected maintenance issues arise.

As we approach the 100th anniversary of the Newman Center next year, we must also begin planning for this significant milestone, which will require additional effort and resources.

If you are able and willing to support this mission, I would love to speak with you about how you can contribute. Your stewardship—however you are called to give—will help to further the mission of the St. Thomas More Newman Center and continue to transform the lives of our students.
