Fr. John Paul's Spiritual Brew

t's been a week since Easter Sunday! Just last weekend, our church was filled with joyful hearts, lifted voices, and the vibrant energy of resurrection. Our Lenten fasts were completed, our sanctuary was alive with color and beauty, and the spirit of new life radiated through our Easter hymns.

Today, we journey deeper into the joy of the Easter Season. Once again, we encounter the unrelenting persistence of God's love-calling us to rise, to walk, and to live in that love.

We find the disciples hiding-behind locked doors, closed minds, and fearful hearts. They're gripped by physical and emotional pain, haunted by the trauma of Jesus' arrest and crucifixion. They fear they might be next. And who could blame them?

Fr. John Paul's Letter

Dear Stewards and Friends of the St. Thomas More Newman Center Catholic Community,

Happy Easter!

Our Lenten journey has come to its beautiful conclusion, and now we rise together, echoing the joyful proclamation: *He is Risen!* As we embrace the season of renewal, I hope this "springtime" has brought new life to each of us, just as Lent is meant to do.

Over the past seven weeks, the Newman Center has been vibrant with energy and life:

- We've seen a notable increase in student participation—Mass attendance has grown, confessions are more frequent, and our student-led programs like Torch Bible Studies and Newman Nights are thriving.
- More than just numbers, there's a palpable sense of community being cultivated in the spontaneous hangouts and connections forming every day.

However, this growth has come with its own set of challenges. In recent months, we've experienced a substantial increase in operational costs. Rising utility bills, retreat center fees, and food costs—exacerbated by the welcome rise in student engagement—have all contributed to growing expenses.

In addition, we've encountered an unexpected and costly issue at the rectory. After nearly a century of dependable service, the water pipes in my casita began to fail. A persistent puddle in the kitchen led us to discover a spraying pipe—and another close to rupture. While the immediate plumbing repairs cost us \$1,500, further investigation revealed mold and asbestos, leading to an unplanned \$22,000 in remediation expenses. Thankfully, diocesan property insurance covered \$10,000, and additional coverage is expected.

I am deeply grateful to those in our community who responded with generosity during this time. Special thanks to the Smith family, the Lopez Foundation, and several others whose support has made it possible for me to return to my casita by late May or early June. Your kindness has moved me deeply.

As we manage these immediate needs, we must also look toward our long-term stability. To that end, we are actively working to build an endowment that will support:

- 1. Student ministry programs
- 2. Building and grounds maintenance
- 3. Ongoing operational costs

Thanks to the incredible generosity of Humberto Lopez—who has pledged a \$250,000 matching grant—we are making meaningful strides toward this goal. I invite you to prayerfully consider contributing at whatever level you're able. Beyond this major gift, we're focusing on three practical strategies to strengthen our financial foundation:

- 1. Securing major donations to build our endowment
- 2. Increasing our weekly collection by \$3,000 to comfortably meet our current and future needs
- 3. Encouraging giving from both students and non-students, through Venmo, online giving, and weekly collections—reminding our students that even \$3-\$5 a week, consistently given, can make a significant impact

I understand that recent transitions—Bishop Weisenburger's move to Detroit, the pause of the diocesan capital campaign, and the upcoming appointment of a new bishop—may cause uncertainty. I want to assure you that Bishop Kicanas and the Diocese remain deeply committed to the Newman Center during this interim period.

Just two weeks ago, Bishop Kicanas convened a planning meeting with all the key stakeholders of our Newman Expansion Project, including diocesan leadership, our architects and construction partners, and the Catholic Foundation. It was a joy to have everyone in the same room—enthusiastic, united, and focused on the next steps. The main task ahead is clear: we need to secure the necessary funding. The Catholic Foundation will also assist in developing a compelling case and materials to help us engage potential major donors.

Our pastoral staff, though small, is dedicated and resilient—but we cannot maintain this level of activity without the resources to support it. Since arriving at Newman in the fall of 2016, my vision has been to establish a robust, sustainable endowment for the Center—separate from the generous (but often limited) support we receive from the Newman Foundation, Sustaining Board, diocesan contributions, and weekly collections. This will help reduce our reliance on urgent appeals each time a new challenge arises.

As we look toward the 100th anniversary of the Newman Center next year, we will also begin planning for this historic celebration—a joyful milestone that will require additional support and preparation.

If you feel called to support our mission in any way, I would be honored to speak with you. Your generosity—whether in prayer, time, or treasure—directly furthers the mission of the St. Thomas More Newman Center and transforms the lives of the students we serve.
