## Fr. John Paul's Spiritual Brew

he corruptible body burdens the soul, and the earthen shelter weighs down the mind that has many concerns." This line from our first reading in the Book of Wisdom really struck me. It reminds us that our bodies—and really, our whole selves—are always in transition. From the moment we are born, we are set on a path that is passing through this life and moving toward eternity. But this doesn't mean we should just sit back and watch life pass us by. Not at all. Rather, it's a call to discover what God desires of us while we are here—and to consider the intention and energy with which we live out whatever we are doing. Wisdom reminds us that we see only part of life's design, while God sees the entire mosaic. And today's Gospel shows us, through one of Jesus' vivid parables, that discipleship requires us to let go of whatever is not of God.

For God is the true source of all our blessings: our family, our friends, our loved ones, even the possessions and treasures we hold dear. If we fail to recognize this, we risk becoming deaf to his voice, blind to his presence, and closed off to the life-giving love he longs to share with us. That is why Jesus uses such strong language in the Gospel when he tells us to "hate" anything that separates us from life, joy, healing, and peace. He's not calling us to despise people or gifts, but to reject whatever stands in the way of God's love. And then he speaks of "calculating the cost" of discipleship—of preparing ourselves to carry the crosses of our lives, whether they be anxiety, anger, sadness, fear, or anything else that weighs us down. When we step back and calculate, when we breathe instead of panic, when we slow down and refocus, life becomes more manageable. We make better decisions. We walk with greater peace. So in this sense, "hating" means refusing to cling to whatever is opposed to love, peace, healing, and hope. And the daily practice of stepping back—of creating a discipline of grounding ourselves—gives us strength and clarity for each day. It keeps us centered on what truly matters.

Last week we heard that humility (humus—the earth, the ground) is what roots us. This grounding gives us peace, keeps us sober, and allows us to see with good perspective. As summer draws to a close and fall approaches, may this be a time to reflect on where we want our hearts to rest. May we remain steady, grounded in God's love, so that his truth and peace may infuse us.

Amen! Alleluia!


