Fr. John Paul's Spiritual Brew

Let your yes mean yes, and your no mean no” These are powerful words from today’s Gospel and they’re not just about speech. They’re about *integrity*. They invite us to ask: Do we really know what we’re saying? Do we truly mean it? And perhaps most importantly, do we *own* it?

Every single day, our lives are filled with questions and choices. Some are small: *shorts or jeans today?* And some are life-shaping: *Do I really want to propose to this person? Is God calling me to religious life? Am I finally ready to confront this habit that’s hurting me and others?* These daily decisions invite deeper questions beneath the surface: What do I believe? What are my values? What or *who* is really worth giving my life for?

In today’s Gospel, Jesus tells us plainly: “I have not come to abolish the Law or the Prophets, but to fulfill them.” Jesus comes as the *union of the divine and the human* to show us how faith is not just something we *know* intellectually, but something we *live* with our whole being. He leads us to the heart of it all: “To love the Lord your God with your whole heart, mind, and soul... and to love your neighbor and yourself the same way.” This is why, in Matthew’s Gospel, Jesus says: “You have heard it said... *but I say to you.*” He is forming us not just in rules, but in charity—the love from which all commandments flow. This is the love that becomes light and salt—a light that never dims, a salt that never loses its flavor. It’s what allows us to wander—but never be lost.

As we gather in this Centennial year, celebrating 100 years of faith, welcome, and love at the Newman Center—we are reminded that real love endures when *yes* truly means *yes*. It endures through generations, cultures, struggles, and hope. During this Black History Month, we also honor a witness of faith that has consistently proclaimed dignity, perseverance, and love in action—often in the face of injustice—reminding the Church and the world what it looks like to live the Gospel with courage and conviction.

May we allow God’s blessing to live in us—*fully*. May our lives become an *encounter* that transforms us, through the living Christ—the saving Truth and Love of God in our midst, and today, as part of this 100-year story of love, we are blessed at our 11:00AM Mass by the presence of several married couples—some married here at the Newman Center, others in sacred places that also witnessed God’s covenant of love. I now invite these couples to please stand, to turn and face one another, and together, to renew the vows that first said *yes*—and continue to say *yes*—to love. May we be one!

Amen! Alleluia!

February 15 **Bessie Coleman** (1892-1926)

First Black/ Native American US female pilot/first Black international pilot/activist

Young woman ventriloquist: Sesame St puppeteer, performed on television shows Tu Si Que Vales (Italy), Die Puppenstars (Germany), and Showtime at the Apollo

February 17 **Maya Angelou** (1928-2014)

Poet, writer, actress and activist

February 21 **Chadwick Boseman** (1976-2020)

February 19 **Lewis H. Latimer** (1848-1928)

Inventor and innovator; expert draftsman; author of poetry and books; patent consultant; played the violin and flute, taught immigrants English and drafting; lived in Flushing, Queens.

February 20 **Henrietta Lacks** (1920-1951)

Exploited for medical research/ "immortal cells" which have helped countless patients without the consent nor knowledge of her parents.



The cell line named for her, HeLa (pronounced hee-lah), has been at the core of treatments for hemophilia, herpes, influenza, leukemia, and Parkinson's disease as well as the polio vaccine, the cancer drug tamoxifen, chemotherapy, gene mapping, and in vitro fertilization.
